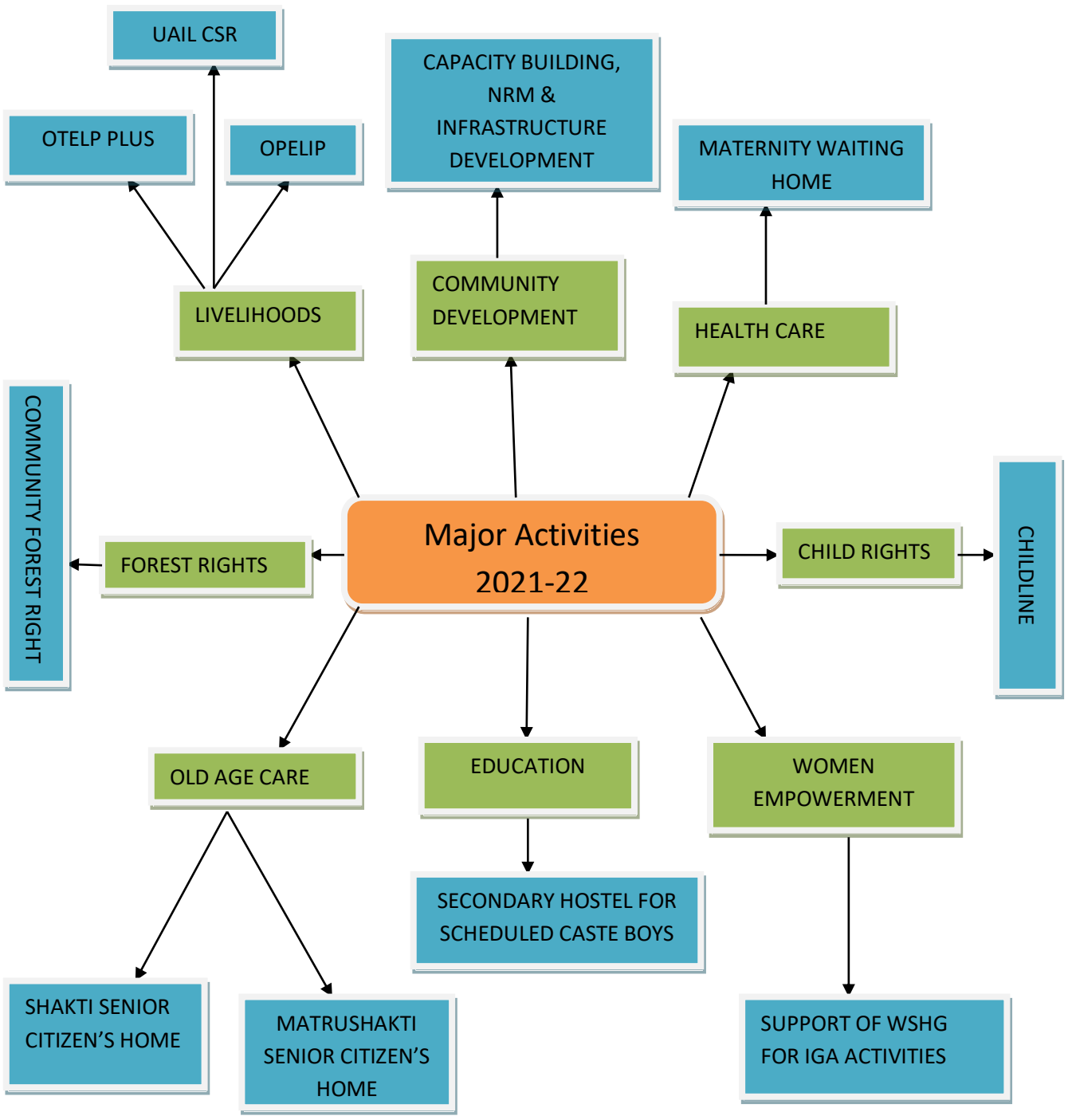

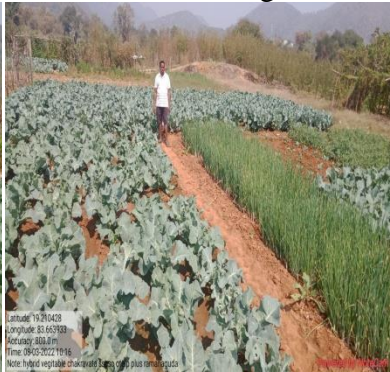

Goal:

CHILDLINE, RAYAGADA:-

The CHILDLINE is 24 hours (night & day) free phone outreach service, which can be accessed by a child in distress or anybody on behalf of child can dial the number 1098 on telephone. CHILDLINE provides emergency assistance to a child as soon as possible based on child's need.



The CHILDLINE service focuses on the needs of children living alone on the streets, child laborers working in unorganized sector, domestic workers and sexually abused children. The child is rescued & referred to an appropriate organization for long-term follow up and care. Main objective of the Programme is to contribute and work towards strengthening and participating in a global movement that addresses issues related to child protection and ensures that children's voices are heard.

Activities:-

- Responding to calls on the national toll free number 1098 and provision to rescue and offer emergency outreach services for children in need of care and protection.
- Coordinating rescue and other outreach services with the help of relevant local departments like police, administration, labour, health, railways and others.
- Ensuring proper documentation of all children rescued to facilitate their rehabilitation and restoration, where necessary.
- Producing children before the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) to ensure care and protection and supporting the CWC in the long-term rehabilitation of children, where required.
- Providing data related to children rescued and rehabilitated for the compilation of a national comprehensive database of child protection.
- Creating awareness and ensuring access to the 1098 Child helpline (CHILDLINE) number.
- Conduction of extracurricular activities like rangoli, drawing, dance competition among students for improvement of skills.

Case Studies:

Case Study-1

Rescue of Missing Child

Background of the Child:

One minor boy named Kuldeep Naik, S/O-Jhuman Naik, aged about 12 years live At-New colony, Ps/block/Dist-Rayagada odisha. He was studying in class- V at Sent Xavier School, Rayagada. Kuldeep was missing from 12.08.21 from his home at Rayagada.



Contact with CHILDLINE: On dated 16.08.2021 Childline, Rayagada got a phone call from CCC Kolkata regarding the missing of the minor male child from his home.

Distress situation/circumstances:

The father of the child had beaten him for which he left home without any information to family.

Action taken:

The child was rescued from Bobili glass agency through the effort of CHILDLINE, Rayagada, then produced at CWC and restored to family. He was going through counseling by CHILDLINE counselor and agreed not to conduct such type of behaviour for second time. Now he is continuing his study.

CHILDLINE intervention:

After getting the information CHILDLINE collected the child documents like photo, FIR copy and Aadhar card. After filling up the missing form and letter to Child Welfare Committee, Rayagada for permission of circular of photograph CWC order no-



533/cwc/Rayagada. On dated 16.08.2021 CHILDLINE, Rayagada sent the missing child details to CHILDLINE INDIA FOUNDATION to circulate in CHILDLINE network. After getting information from public regarding the child who was working at the glass agency at Bobili, Vizianagaram district, Andhrapradesh about 75 kms. Distance from Rayagada, immediately CHILDLINE team and parents went to the spot and rescued the child from glass agency, Bobili on 29.08.21. Then produced before CWC on 30.08.21 and restored to family followed by proper counseling by CHILDLINE counselor for which the child has given his consent to continue his study and not to conduct such type of mistakes for second time.

CHILDLINE Impact:

Through CHILDLINE intervention the child was rescued, restored to family and undergone proper counseling for which the child is now continuing his normal life at his home. The parents of the child expressed their gratitude to the CHILDLINE team, Rayagada for such type of cooperation.

Case Study: 02

Rescue of 13 minor girl children from trafficking

Background of the children: Thirteen minor tribal girl children of Kalyansingpur Block of Rayagada were belonging to distressed families whose parents are working as labours. Due to poor economic condition of their families the children were persuaded by a mediator to work in outstate for earning money. For which they were travelling to Hyderabad of Telangana State to engage in stitching and handicraft activities.

Contact with Childline: Childline, Rayagada received a phone call on dt. 8.04.2021 from CCC, Kolkata regarding the trafficking of minor girl children and followed by the phone call Childline team started rescue operation in coordination of GRP, RPF and Labour Department, Rayagada and finally succeeded in rescuing the targeted children.

Distress Situation/Circumstances: Poverty of families

Impact on children: Due to distress situation of families the minor girl children were ready to leave their families to work outside for earning purpose during the difficult period of spread of pandemic covid-19, which was risk for their health condition. There were also chances of exploitation or trafficking of the minor children at the out state beyond their native place.

Childline Intervention: The Childline team played active role in rescue of the minor girls from trafficking, producing the cases before CWC, Rayagada, informing to DCPO, Rayagada and placing the children at CCI for temporary shelter at Sneh Swadhar Greh, Rayagada going through the proper channels. Besides this the children were counseled by Counselor of Childline and detailed information was collected. After tracing



of their respective families by Childline team, the children were restored to their families through CWC, Rayagada.

Childline Impact: Due to intervention of Childline the children were rescued, counseled and restored to their families. During follow up Childline came to know that now they are safe at their families and helping their mothers at house activities. So 13 minor girls remained save from trafficking especially during the pandemic situation of Covid-19.

Shakti Senior Citizens' Home:-

India is the second largest country in population explosion. Large numbers of people over the age of 60 are neglected in their families for getting better hospitality. Most of them are very poor and lives in rural areas. The elderly have little hope of escaping poverty and their situation only becomes worse as they get older and are increasingly plagued by chronic health problems. Impoverished elderly women face a particularly difficult situation, especially those who are widows. Given their low rank in society, their inability to work and they are unable to survive on their own.

Aim & Objective:

- To foster the welfare of the aged especially the needy aged, irrespective of caste or creed.
- To create in the younger generation and in society a social awareness about the problems of the elderly in today's Society.
- To create environment for senior citizen where they can live freely with dignity.

Shakti's Effort for Aged Care:

SHAKTI has been working on the issues of senior citizens for the last fourteen years. As a part of its effort for senior citizen, there are two types of initiative focusing on the elderly people in the Rayagada District i.e. Non- institutional care & Institutional Care.

i). Non-Institutional Care:

We have been serving the old age people in need. We are helping them to get old age pensions, legal counseling, and Cataract operations and helping them in enrolling in emergency feeding programme. Field staffs are visiting the elderly person in our operational areas; render counseling to them and their family members. We also provide them psychosocial care. We have conducted 12 meetings to create social awareness about the problems of the elderly people, among the younger generation and in society as well as awareness on preventive measures of Covid 19. A total of 132 elderly persons got our services during last year.

ii). Institutional Care:

Shakti has been running a Senior Citizens Home at Rayagada. The programme is funded by the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India and aims to support the socio-economic development of disadvantaged older people by providing shelter, food, cloth and health care. Under this programme, the Senior Citizen Home has 25 strength for destitute and neglected elderly persons, who have nobody else to take care of them. This is a safe & secure place, where they can freely live with dignity. Senior citizens are supported with Shelter, Food, Cloth and Medical care at the Senior Citizen Home regularly.

Health Care:

The Doctor visits the Senior Citizens Home once in a Week and conducts health check-up. Medicines are provided as per the prescription of Doctor. In case of any serious illness of inmate, we admit them in the Dist. Hospital. Besides the weekly health check up 6 nos. of cataract surgery were conducted during this period.

Others Facilities:

Inmates are entertained by the television, Oriya Newspaper, story books, spiritual books provided by SHAKTI. All necessary commodities like hair oil, bathing soap are provided regularly to the inmates. Counseling service to the inmates was done by the counselor on regular basis.

Participatory Management:

We encouraged the inmates to bring solidarity among themselves through decentralize the responsibility in a participatory management system in day to day activities of Senior Citizen Home. By the facilitation, they have formed following Groups to co-ordinate and management various responsibility smoothly.

- Subcommittee for Food & Cloth.
- Subcommittee for Yoga (Exercise), Meditation, Prayer & Religious discourse
- Subcommittee for Personal Decorum

- Subcommittee for Health & Personal hygiene
- Subcommittee for Sanitation
- Subcommittee for Social work & Recreation.

Continue assistance to the subcommittee and planning cum-review meeting held in every fortnight, the performance of subcommittee has upgraded.

As the project management team one Superintendent for overall management, one counselor, Midwife-Nurse, one Cook-cum-peon, three nos. of Multi Task Staff and one part time Doctor also a part time Yoga Therapist are looking after the inmates of Senior Citizens Home. Our staffs are trained to be prompt, patient and sympathetic towards the inmates.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES:

- **Yoga & Meditation** : Inmates are practicing Yoga & Meditation daily under the guidance of our trained Yoga Therapist.
- **Evening Walk** : Evening Walks are done daily by the inmates under the guidance of the Mid Wife nurse.
- **Health & Hygiene** : Inmates are cutting their nails every week & Hair once in a month. They are involved in keeping the surroundings clean doing some social work like road cleaning with the guidance of our project Coordinator.
- **Observed National Day & festivals:** Inmates observed Independent Day, Republic Day, and Holi etc to build up nationality & brotherhood relationship.
- **Picnic:** Picnic for inmates conducted once in a year for refreshment of their mind during which they are taken by bus to nearest picnic spots.

‘Matrushakti’ Senior Citizens’ Home

Very old people, due to their reduced mobility and debilitating disabilities, need other people to do things for them. With the increasing trend of nuclear families in the society and with fewer children in the family, the care of older persons in the families gets increasingly difficult. Therefore, it is necessary to safeguard the elderly people who are absolutely neglected, ill-treated and vulnerable. It could be addressed by establishing a care giving unit especially for the elderly people that will dedicatedly work on meeting their needs.

SHAKTI organization is implementing another Senior Citizen’s Home in the district Head Quarter of Rayagada with 50 bed capacities from the year 2018-19 where 50 distressed old age persons are kept and taken care. Although SHAKTI organization realizes that an elderly person deserves an attention from their family but looking at the data it is found that the number of neglected elderly people is rapidly increasing and there is a huge need of an intervention to address the problems that are elderly people are facing at the moment.

Aim Objective:

- To foster the welfare of the aged especially the needy aged widow.
- To create in the younger generation and in society a social awareness about the problems of the elderly in today’s Society.
- To create environment for senior citizen widow women where they can live freely with dignity.
- To empower them to lead a life of dignity and respect
- To provide friendly residential or a care home environment.
- To provide a quality of life, this enables residents to retain their independence, identity and a sense of value to the life.

Shakti's Effort:

We believe, sustained efforts would not only create older persons friendly environment, it would also awaken a sense of responsibility amongst us all to make this possible. It is very essential to provide emotional support to the elders. Hence every care is taken by the home being responsible & with patience hearing to them.

Information of the “Matrushakti Senior Citizen’s Home:

Presently it is catering to the needs of providing shelter, clothing, food, medical attention, spiritual and emotional support to 50 elderly inmates. These old persons are mostly picked from the rural areas to be provided with shelter and care till their last breathe. Some of the inmates can walk normally and some are physically disable, who require some assistance to move and carry out their daily routine etc. Our home is having total 16 rooms & 09 washrooms. Out of 16 rooms, 14 rooms filled with inmates, 1 room is used as stock room & one room is used for kitchen. One TV is installed in the hall. We have a small garden within the boundary as well one kitchen garden is there for agricultural practices near to our home. We are focusing on two types of initiatives for the elderly people in Rayagada district i.e. Non-institutional care & institutional care.



Non-Institutional Care:

Not only we provide the older age people food & shelter we also look after their social issues. We have been serving the older age people in need. We are helping them to get old age pensions, legal counseling, and Cataract operations and helping them in enrolling in emergency feeding programme. Field staffs are visiting the elderly person in our operational areas; render counseling to them and their family members.



We also provide them psychosocial care. We have conducted 23 meetings to create social awareness about the problems of the elderly people, among the younger generation and in society. A total of 139 elderly persons got our services during last year.

Institutional Care:

Through our Senior Citizen’s Home we are providing institutional care to the distressed old age people irrespective of any gender, caste or creed. The programme is funded by the Ministry

of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India and aims to support the socio-economic development of disadvantaged older people by providing shelter, food, cloth and health care. Under this programme of the Senior Citizens' Home 50 nos. of destitute and neglected elderly are provided with institutional care, those have nobody else to take care of them. This is a safe & secure place, where they can freely live with dignity. The elderly are supported with Shelter, Food, Cloth and Medical care at (our) Senior Citizens Home.

A day in our Senior citizens Home

The day starts in the home with a wakeup call to all the inmates in the morning at 6.30 a.m. followed by a cup of tea. After complete of their daily work, Yoga practice session continues. They are served with morning breakfast at 8.30 a.m. after which they go around the home and do miscellaneous works of their choice or chat among themselves & getting fresh up to prayer class by 9.30am.



Around 12.30 p.m. their lunch is served with a menu of Rice, Dal, Curry, Sambar in the dining hall. After lunch they take rest for about two hours or so and approx. by 4.00 in the evening they come out and relax with a cup of tea. Fruit or biscuits are served as evening snacks after which they all go to evening walk as well as involve with agriculture practices. They again get ready by 6.00 pm for evening prayer followed by meditation. In the evening TV show is arranged for 1.5 to 2 hours. In the night dinner served at 8.00pm after which they go to bed.

Medical Check-ups:

The health condition of all inmates of home is monitored regularly by our nurse. Advanced medical equipment like thermometer, stethoscope, digital BP meter and one touch blood sugar monitor are made available to closely monitor the health condition of inmates. The doctor visits the home once in a week and also attends to emergencies. Medicines are provided as per the prescription by Doctor. In necessary cases we take them to the Dist. Hospital & we do as per doctors' advice. Besides these we organize cataract operations, TB test, Health Camps & Dental camps.



Celebrations:

The home celebrates some special occasions like Independence Day, Republic Day, Elders Day, Father's Day, Mother's day, inmates Birthday & special cultural functions festivals.

Recreation:

To make entertain our inmates we have one television which has fixed in common room. We have provided newspaper, story books, and spiritual books for time pass of the inmates. We have provided Ludo, Snake & Ladder, carom board to play & shows movie through LCD projector once in a week. In each evening they enjoy dance & songs to get out of stress. Interested inmates are doing gardening & agricultural practices.

**Necessary Commodities**

We provide basic needs like one bed set with blanket, one Steel water glass, one steel tea glass, one tray as well we provides them necessary commodities like tooth paste, hair oil, bathing soap, detergent powder, nail cutter & other requirements in regular intervals to the inmates.

**Last Journey**

Funeral rights are performed to the aged persons who depart this life in the home. The last rights are performed with all traditional rituals and carried to the burial ground in the vehicle "Swarga Ratham". We do the rituals as per their culture.

Participatory Management:

We encouraged the inmates to bring solidarity among them through decentralizing the responsibility in a participatory management system in day to day activities of Senior Citizen Home. By the facilitation, they have formed following Groups to co-ordinate and management various responsibility smoothly.

Secondary Hostel for SC Students

Rayagada District is one of the southern districts of Odisha which is declared as one of the aspirational districts of Odisha by Government of India. This district is home land for various indigenous communities including schedule castes. As per 2011 census the SC population in the district is 139514 (14.4%) of total population. The literacy rate is 56% in the district and the school dropout rate in upper primary level is 17.10% which is highest in the state. One of the major reasons behind the drop out is poverty to continue for education at secondary level. It has been observed that in Rayagada district scope of educational facilities for ST students is better through ITDAs and due to priority reservations in hostels of High Schools where as scope for the SC students is limited because of dominance of ST population in the district for which the SC students belonging to poor and vulnerable families have little scope of hostel facilities to continue their education at secondary level.

Therefore Shakti Organisation, Rayagada had planned for initiating a SC Hostel for the high school students to give scope to the needy SC students to study at High Schools of Rayagada Head Quarter with hostel facilities.

Aim & Objective:

- Education facility to needy SC students of class IX and X from throughout district to complete High School Certificate exam successfully.
- To support the students with study material, uniform and tuition facility including nutritious diet and comfortable accommodation.
- To enable an environment for the inmate students where they can grow properly to reach their aim.

Shakti's Effort for SC Hostel:

Shakti is running the Hostel at district head quarter of Rayagada with 100 bed capacity through efficient and dedicated staffs. All facilities including accommodation, food, medicine, games and sports material are available at the hostel to provide the students a comfortable and growing environment to improve in their studies.

Total 100 needy SC students were admitted at the Hostel during FY 21-22 out of which 06 students belonged to 10th class and 94 students belonged to 9th class. They were supported with study materials, two times tuition sessions, game materials for both indoor and outdoor games besides the bed facility for accommodation and in time diets including breakfast, lunch, evening snacks and dinner. Water purifier has been installed in the hostel for which children are getting safe drinking water. Morning yoga and exercise sessions are used to be conducted on every Sundays. There is routine Health check up by visiting doctors with maintenance of student wise Health Check up profiles. First Aid Box is also maintained in the hostel with essential accessories and medicines for immediate first aid when required. On holidays cultural programmes including singing, dancing are used to be conducted for recreation of students and to expose their talents.

Follow of scheduled activities as per daily routine and discipline are maintained in the hostel for which this hostel provides a secure and enabling environment for the students to grow up properly.

Health Care:

In Health Care, we maintained the First Aid Box with stock of basic medicines and inmates are oriented about



use of the same in case of emergency. The part time Doctor Dr. UtkalRath, MBBS visit the Hostel one in a fortnight to the Hostel and conducts the health checkup of Hostel inmates and provides necessary medicines. Serious health cases are referred to the Dist. Hospital for health care. During 1st half of this year 12 no's doctor's visit and health checkup programs are

conducted. Individual Health Profiles of all 100 inmates are maintained and updated. Medicine stock is also maintained as per the prescription of Doctor. Yoga was conducted once in a week. Mosquito Nets are also provided to all inmates to safeguard from Malaria fever.

Personal Hygiene:

Weekly nail cutting session was conducted on every Sunday as a part of personal hygiene. Inmates are encouraged to follow hand wash methods before taking food.

Special Coaching:

Special Coaching classes were conducted regularly- Morning and Night. Two qualified and experienced Part time teachers are handling coaching classes, revision of course and doubt clearing sessions were conducted regularly. One part time Teacher is handling the Science and Math and another part time teacher is handling all literature subjects. Monthly exams are conducted in the hostel to track the progress of all hostel students.



COVID-19 Protocol:

We followed the Standard Operation Protocol (SOP) of COVID-19 issued by the State Govt. in the Hostel. As per the guideline, we maintained the following things on regular basis,

- a. daily sanitation of hostel common areas,
- b. kept separate isolation room,
- c. masks distributed on fortnightly basis,
- d. touch less sanitiser stand put on place for use,
- e. Awareness session conducted for students on COVID -19 management,
- f. RTPCR test of inmates conducted.
- g. Outside visitors were not allowed.



Study Materials:

All students were provided with sets of Study materials, 14 nos of Note Books were provided to each of students along with Geometry Box, Exam Board, and Pen & Pencils.



Nutrition:

Hostel Students are provided with nutritious food as per the guideline. They are provided Breakfast, Lunch, Evening Snacks, and Dinner daily as per the displayed menu. Non-Veg curries are served weekly thrice. Food quality is monitored by the warden on daily basis. Kitchen hygiene is maintained properly and foods are cooked through LPG gas. Water Purifier is installed for purified drinking water. Students are served batch wise.

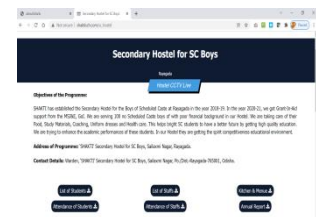

Website & CC Camera:

The Hostel has its own website- http://shaktisch.com/sc_hostel, and it is updated regularly. Students' attendance and staff attendances are updated on monthly basis and uploaded in the website for transparency. The staff list and Beneficiaries lists are uploaded in the website and E-Anudan Portal. 12 nos CC Cameras are installed in the Hostel Premises and the live telecast is available in the website with password protection.



Extra-Curricular activity:

Students are provided Indoor sports items and outdoor sports items for play. Carem board, Chess Board and Ludus are provided as part of Indoor sports and Cricket set are provided as outside ports. Daily Prayer is also of the routine activity. Students' feedback box is placed, so that the beneficiaries and their parents can give us feedback on management quality of Hostel. As the part of NCPDR guideline, POSCO BOX, Childline Phone No, and Emergency contact no's are displayed prominently in the Hostel.

Maternity Waiting Home

Goal-

Goal of this Project is to provide institutional care to pregnant women of remote areas for their safe delivery at Hospital to reduce mother and child mortality.

Reduction in mother and child mortality:-

Institutional care of mother is very much necessary in remote tribal belt areas for safe maternity where majority of the women are illiterate, believing in superstitions and facing hurdles to go to hospital due to communication problem. One maternity waiting home (Maa Gruha) is running by SHAKTI Organization under NRHM Scheme at Kashipur Block of Rayagada District. This Block of Rayagada District is well known as dominated area of poor rural indigenous tribal mass who believes in traditional superstitions instead of hospital for check up, treatment and delivery.

SHAKTI Organization has accepted the challenge in motivating the pregnant women of such villages to stay at Maa Gruha and to ensure their safe delivery at Hospital thereby reducing mother and child mortality. Pregnant women 10 days before delivery date are invited to stay at Maa Gruha with an escort till their safe delivery. They were served with comfortable accommodation including bed facility, food, regular check up by ANM, counseling through IEC materials by Lady Health Assistants and assisted by the Maa Gruha staffs in every aspect till their delivery. At Kashipur Block during FY 21-22 total 294 cases (SC-130, ST-116, OBC-48) were admitted at Maa Gruha covering 11 remote GPs of Kashipur such as Mandibisi, Godibali, Siripai, Adajore, Sunger, Renga, Talajhiri, Chandragiri, Manusgaon, Maikanch, Sindurghati with 16 Sub-centre which include 228 villages. Cases from remotest area where movement of vehicle is difficult & from destitute families are always given more priority to ensure their safe delivery.

Case Study:

Malanti Naik, W/O- Bipindra Naik, Village- Champajodi, Po- Renga, Block- Kashipur, Dist.- Rayagada aged about 24 years live with his Father in law and Mother in law who are too aged and unable to take care of her. Her husband is a migrant worker who is working as labour in Kerala State which is far distance from their native place. Her husband also used to come home rarely. So Malanti was hopeless in this situation with the date of EDD coming nearer and nearer. She was feeling herself helpless as nobody was there to take care of her and to stand with her in case of any emergency. Staffs of Maa Gruha reached their and brought Malanti to Maa Gruha with help of Ambulance. She stayed there continuously for 11 days, during which she was taken care properly which includes regular health checkups, counseling on maternal care, intake of in time nutritious diet & safe drinking



water, comfortable rest within mosquito net etc. After 11 days of staying at Maa gruha she gave birth to a daughter infant at PHC, Kashipur. She used to get the psychological support of staffs of Maa Gruha who remained with her till giving birth to the baby. Both the mother and baby were in good condition. Malanti was very happy by getting the support of Maa Gruha because of which she gave birth to her baby without facing any obstacles.

Community Forest Right:

The objective of this project is to fight for the rights of indigenous community over forest land they are dwelling year after year from their ancestors. We facilitate the Community Forest Right activities through FOGGO Network (Forum for Green Governance in Odisha) & with support of Foundation for Ecological Security(FES).Operational Area-Rayagada Block of Rayagada District Achievement- Total 80 numbers of Forest Right Committee (FRC) have been formed in 6 Gram Panchayats of Rayagada Block through conduction of Gram Sabhas followed by preparation of documents to be submitted at SDLC.

CSR INTERVENTION:

In view of building a better and sustainable way of life for the weaker sections of the society, SHAKTI has got an opportunity to implement livelihood promotion activities under CSR project of Utkal Alumina, Tikiri, Rayagada. We are involved in following activities.

Janaseba Trust- We have shared professional staffs with Utkal Alumina Janaseba Trust for the implementation of WADI plantation activities in Kashipur Block.

UAIL Farm Based Livelihood- We have shared professional staffs with Utkal Alumina CSR for implementation of farm based livelihood activities at Kashipur Block which include project Samrudhi-2 for seed distribution & enhancement in agriculture activities, project Sugandha for MGNREGA activities & lemon grass cultivation, facilitation of agro-craft producer company.

UAIL Non-Farm Based Livelihood- We have shared professional staffs with Utkal Alumina CSR for implementation of non-farm based livelihood activities at Kashipur Block which includes project Sakshyam for textile unit, initiative to create awareness against early child marriage & to strengthen adolescent girls in the form of project 'Papa ki Pari'.

GRATIFICATION:

The success of story of the year 2021-22 added another chapter to the glory of SHAKTI Organisation. It is of course true that the success, which we have achieved, still requires more perception. But this never kills our instinct and interest. We hail and shower gratification, to those persons and agencies, who have extended their support and help to us, which enable us to undertake number of development activities. We hope similar co-operation in coming times, so that we will continue our services towards the oppressed and suppressed mass.
